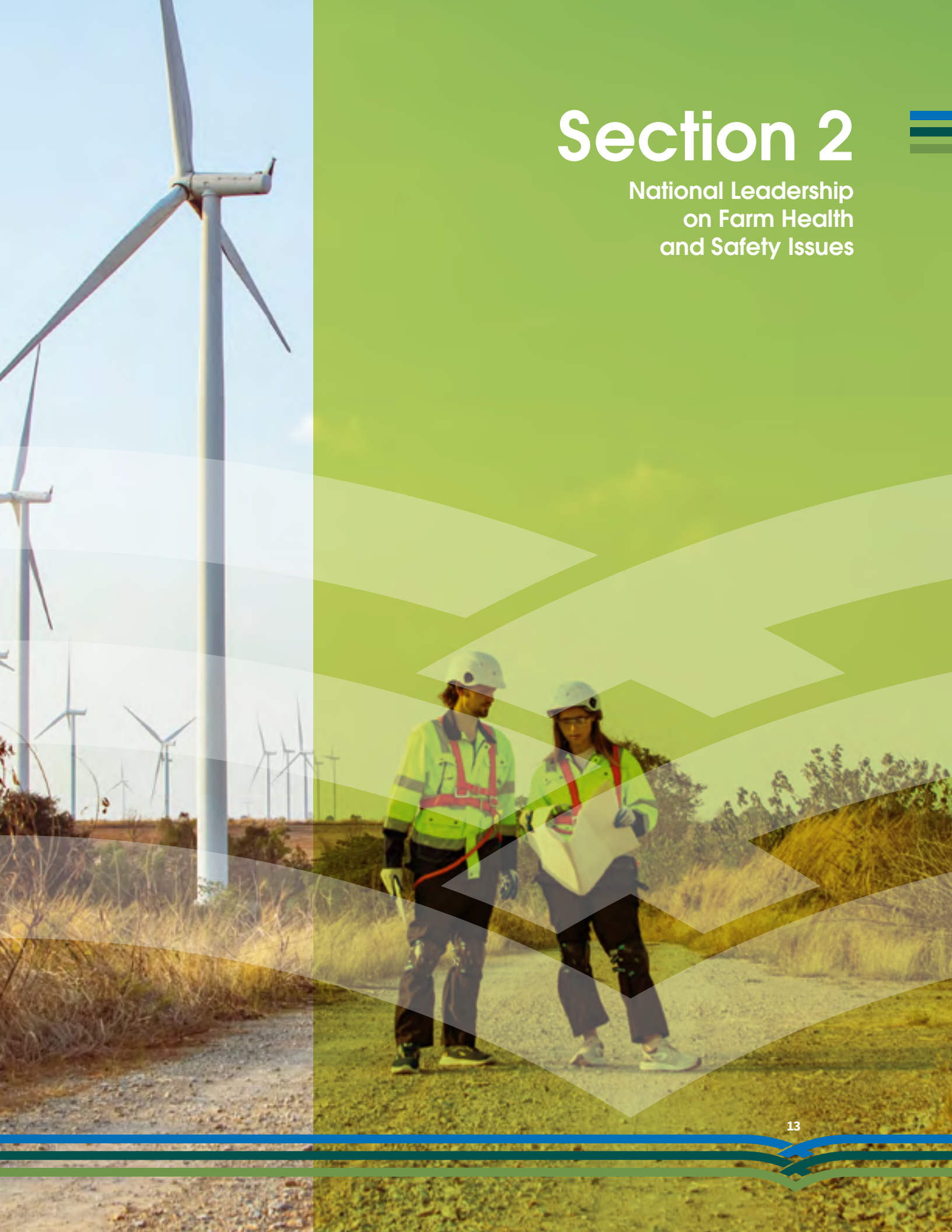

The 2024 edition of the Conference highlighted a diverse range of topics including fostering economic resilience and prosperity, taking control of farm risk, navigating farm transition, attracting and retaining farm labour, emergency preparedness and planning, supporting on-farm health, safety and wellness, and achieving balance on the path to on-farm sustainability.

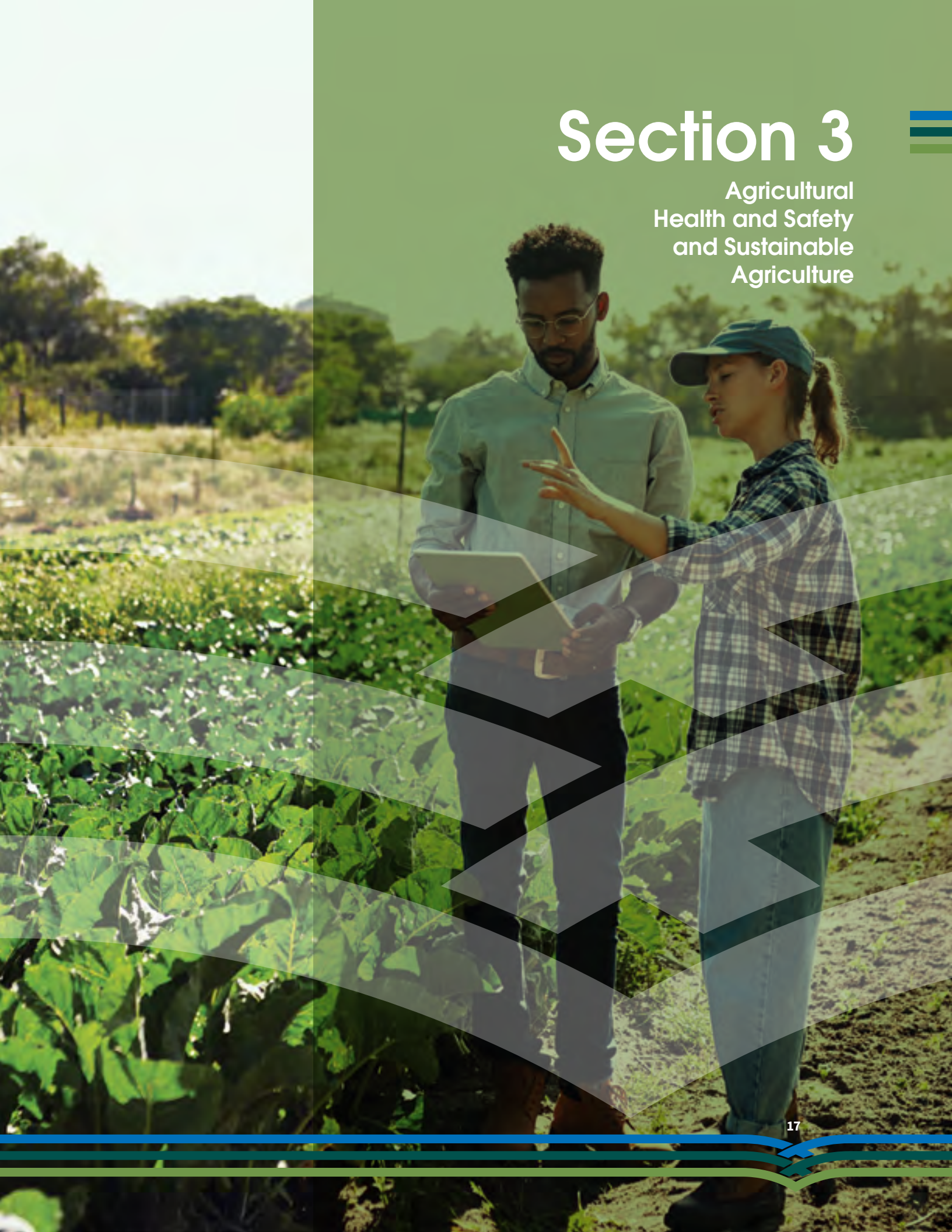
## Connecting with Partners

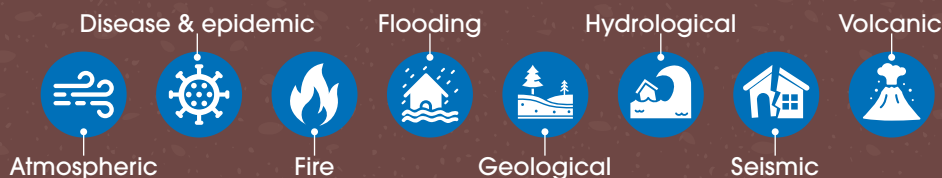

# Mental Health Awareness and Resources

## A Healthy Farm is a Safe Farm

Farming is a demanding occupation characterized by high levels of stress and physical labour. It's hard work – both physically and mentally. These factors contribute significantly to the mental health challenges faced by farmers, farm workers and farm families. The intricate connection between farm work and mental well-being has significant implications, not only for individuals but also for the safety and efficiency of farming operations.

## CASA's Mental Health Hub

The Mental Health Hub is an easy-to-use online directory that connects users to mental wellness resources from experts and trusted organizations across Canada. Whether individuals are seeking help for themselves or a loved one, the hub is designed to guide them toward support that fits their needs.

## Mental Health Matters: Keeping Safe and Well on the Farm

In 2024, CASA in collaboration with mental health advocate and psychologist Cynthia Beck, M. SC., developed a series highlighting the critical link between mental wellness and farm safety.

The series includes infographics and short informational resources that detail practical tips and information about safety behaviours and mental health; sleep and mental wellness; farming, life and stress; dehydration and its effects; and health outcomes and farming hazards.

Farmers work long hours, with little time for themselves. This constant pressure can lead to stress, anxiety, and depression. When work never seems to stop, it's hard to find balance.

Farmers face a lot of physical hazards that can lead to serious health problems, like breathing issues or joint injuries. These health issues are often linked to mental health challenges, like anxiety and depression.

# Progressive Agriculture Safety Day Program®

CASA supports the Progressive Agriculture Safety Day® Program across Canada, recognized as the largest rural safety and health education program for children in North America. Safety Days provide age-appropriate, hands-on educational lessons primarily designed for children ages 4 to 13 years old.

Safety Day Coordinators partner within their community, using one of the four delivery modes, to customize their PAF Safety Day, selecting from more than 30 safety and health topics with hundreds of activities and demonstrations to meet the needs of the youth in their area.

*"It's an opportunity for kids to come together and our local businesses and local volunteers to help basically give an opportunity for kids to learn about various safety hazards and come away with some safety tips. There is a statistic out there that one child every three days dies from an ag-related fatality and so yeah, we're just trying to prevent that from happening in our community."* - Stacy Koisor, Director of Education and Safety, Weyburn Agricultural Society and Safety Day Coordinator

*"Their level of retention is just fantastic," he said. "I presented for many years and, any time after in the summertime, I'd get a handful of kids stop me on the road and say, 'I remember you from Ag Safety Day. I remember you presented on this'. # Teaching Kits

In 2024, CASA shipped 124 agricultural teaching kits to communities across Canada, reaching people of all ages at school and community events. The teaching kits are more than just teaching tools – they are interactive, hands-on experiences that make farm safety education fun, memorable and effective.

CASA's teaching kits are designed to create opportunities for conversation and learning and cover a wide range of common hazards, from chemical safety to grain safety. Teaching kits are free to borrow, are suitable for all ages and locations.

# Celebrating Kids FarmSafe Week

In 2024, the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association (CASA) successfully launched its first annual Kids FarmSafe Week, held from May 13-19, 2024. This initiative marked a significant milestone in CASA's ongoing commitment to promoting safety in agriculture, with a specific focus on the risks children and youth face on farms. The week-long campaign, centered around the theme "Nurturing the Future of Agriculture," aimed to raise awareness within farming communities about the importance of farm safety for children and youth.

The campaign centered around the hashtag **#KeepKidsFarmSafe**, and its primary goal was to educate and encourage action to prevent agriculture-related incidents involving children. According to the latest Canadian Agricultural Injury Reporting (CAIR) data, between 1990 and 2020, 435 children and youth were lost to farming-related accidents.

"One child or youth lost to an on-farm incident is one too many. Tragically, children and youth are often the victims of farming-related accidents," said Andrea Lear, CASA's Chief Executive Officer. "This was something that we, as an industry, need to change, which is why CASA launched Kids FarmSafe Week."

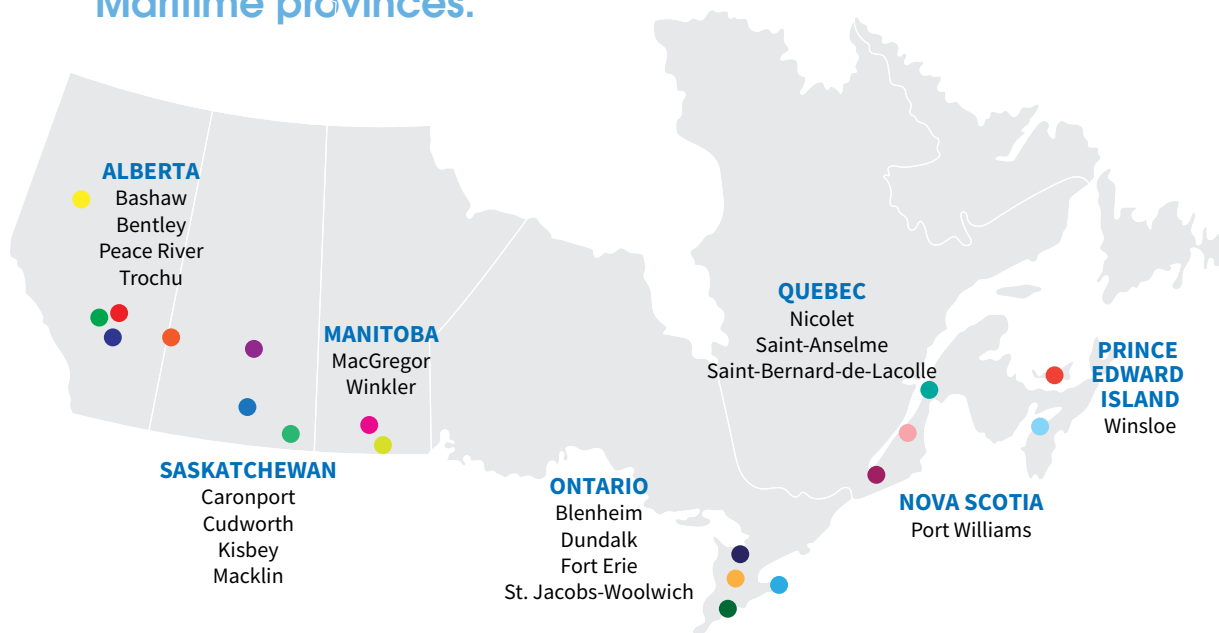

# CASA Celebrates the 4th Annual **BeGrainSafe** Week: Raising Awareness and Saving Lives

In August 2024, CASA proudly celebrated its fourth annual BeGrainSafe Week, held from August 12-18. This annual event was an important part of CASA's ongoing BeGrainSafe program, which was launched in 2017 in response to the growing concerns around grain entrapment fatalities.

Grain entrapment is a significant risk on farms, and it can take only seconds for someone to become a victim. Sadly, many of these accidents are fatal. That's why the goal of BeGrainSafe Week was to draw attention to the hazards associated with grain handling and storage, educate farmers, farm families, farm workers and farming communities on how to stay safe, and ultimately help save lives.

"With BeGrainSafe Week, our objective is to highlight the significance of grain safety and to raise awareness among more Canadians about the hazards associated with grain handling and storage," said Andrea Lear, CASA's Chief Executive Officer.

In support of BeGrainSafe Week, CASA developed a variety of resources, including social media posts, public service announcements, and safety advice articles, filled with information on how to be safe around grain.

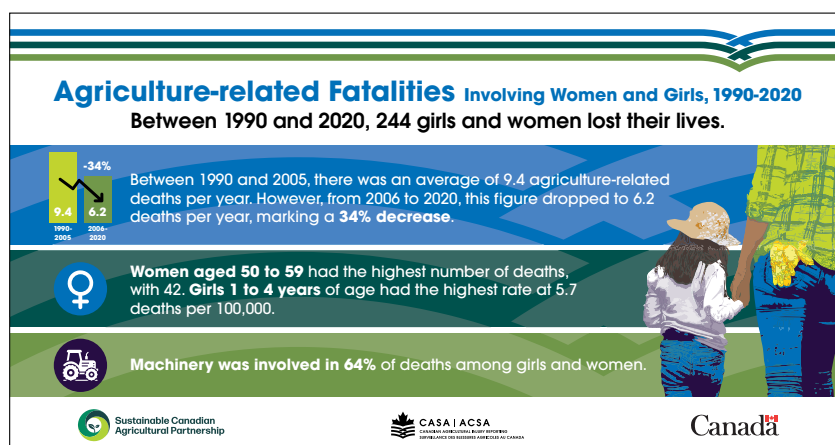
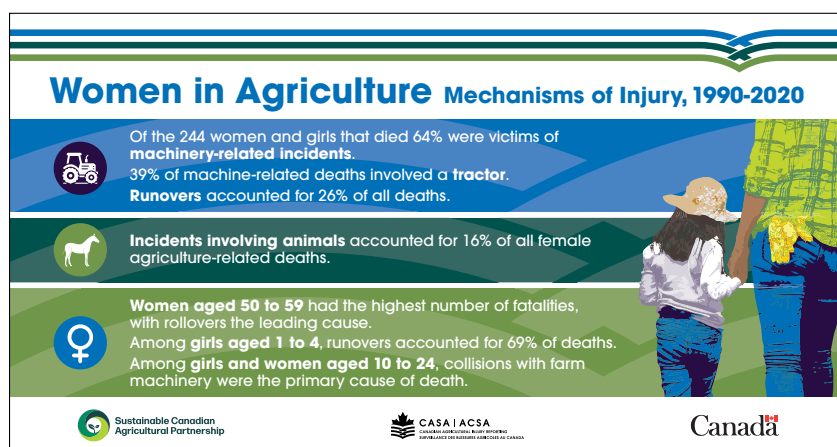

The Canadian Agricultural Injury Reporting (CAIR) is a national program that is funded by the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association (CASA). CAIR is a collaborative program involving various organizations from across Canada. It is coordinated from a national office at the Injury Prevention Centre in the School of Public Health, University of Alberta, in Edmonton, Alberta. The people and organizations that contribute to CAIR include researchers, government agencies and the agricultural industry.

In 2024/25, a new CAIR chapter “Women in Agriculture: 1990 – 2020” was published. This CAIR chapter gives information on women and girls who were killed in an agriculture-related incident, including demographics and mechanism of fatal injury.
